Doing the Math with Ontario MPPs *It Doesn't Add Up!*

More than 5,000 Ontarians have completed the Do the Math survey to date and the results have shown the huge shortfall between meeting the basic necessities of life and monthly income available on social assistance that prevents recipients from being able to live with health and dignity.

Do the Math teams of community leaders including people on social assistance are visiting their MPPs to encourage them to Do the Math and to support the \$100 a month Healthy Food Supplement being promoted by the Put Food in the Budget Campaign (www.putfoodinthebudget.ca).

As of April 2010, 40 MPPs have been visited. Just under half have completed the survey.¹ The results are telling:

- MPPs that have completed the Do the Math survey to date estimate on average that it costs \$1,314 a month to meet the basic necessities of living.
- Using the MPP average cost for basic necessities, the OW recipient would fall \$729 a month short of meeting his/her basic living requirements and a person on ODSP would be \$272 short.
- The estimated costs of monthly necessities do not vary significantly among the three parties, ranging from \$1279 for the PCs to \$1289 for the Liberals and rising to \$1,386 for the NDP MPPs, a difference of just over \$100.

Whether completing the Do the Math survey or not, our MPPs recognize that:

- Current social assistance benefit levels are not adequate to meet the basic food, rent and other essential monthly living needs.

Both OW and ODSP ***“fall short and do not allow people to function properly.”***

transportation, clothing, personal products or a telephone! Nobody should have to choose between food or shelter.”
